A MESSAGE FROM FR TIRSO

I cannot believe that over two weeks have already passed by since I started here at St. Julie. Time is flying by so fast and already my proverbial “to do” list gets longer and longer each day. The important thing, though, is that I have found parishioners who are warm, sincere, and inviting. Thank you to all who made me feel so welcomed.

Now that introductions have been given and I am well into my term here as pastor, it is perhaps as good a time as any to share with you one of the major things on my “to do” list. It is something that I actually inherited from my predecessor, Bishop-elect Lou. He had been planning on doing this even before he was unexpectedly named as the next Bishop of Peoria. When that news came, he wanted to follow through with it prior to his departure and my arrival. Unfortunately, he was unable to do so. He himself expressed his sadness and guilt to me that it is now something that I must do right away. His feelings are rooted in the fact that what I am about to share with the parish is not something that is easy nor do pastors find it pleasant. But, share it I must and it is better to do so now rather than later.

Namely, even before Bishop-elect Lou was appointed to move to Peoria, he knew that a restructuring of the parish staff was desperately needed. For one, even before the start of the pandemic, the parish budget was losing the ability to support the expenses of salaries and benefits as they currently stand. During the pandemic, the parish was able to avail itself of a forgivable loan that allowed parishes to cover salaries and benefits. However, that loan benefit ended as of this past June 30. With the effects of the pandemic still looming and weekend Masses still not at full capacity, our financial situation will quickly be put in even more jeopardy. Bishop-elect Lou knew this to be true which is why he wanted to address it. It now falls on my shoulders to follow through with it.

I have been studying the past and current situation of the parish’s finances. Even before the pandemic, over half of the parish’s income was allocated for salaries and benefits. Especially now with collections being lower than normal because of the pandemic

restrictions, the situation will become dire and take a direction I do not want to go if I do nothing to address it now.

If this is the case, the parish can quickly go into “maintenance mode” instead of “mission mode.” In other words, what would end up happening is the parish would be spending its financial resources just to stay financially in the black and lose focus on the mission to preach the Good News. Having come from other parish assignments where as pastor I inherited huge debt, operating out of “maintenance mode” is not where any parish should be. I do not want to be the one that leads this parish into debt. I am hoping that you are able to see the importance of responding to this situation now even before I complete my first month here at the parish.

I already notified the staff that I will be following through with the plan of restructuring the current staff. What this means is there can be a combination of reduction of hours, reduction of salaries, or even reduction of staff members. I have consulted with Bishop-elect Lou who shared with me what his plan would have been. I have also talked with Fr. Ton, parishioners, and even the Archdiocese. But, what it all comes down to is that I have to figure out what I will need to shepherd our parish community even as I must make some difficult choices.

Even though I do not yet have all of the specifics worked out, what I can say is that the path I take will require and seek for a greater participation and commitment on the part of our parishioners. Leadership roles may need to be entrusted onto lay volunteers in order for us to stay focused on our mission to pray well and to teach the faith. In the very near future, it is safe to say that I will be seeking out parishioners who might be able to assist me with this endeavor.

I know what some of you might already be thinking. “I hope he does not ask me because I do not have the skills.” To that I will respond by saying that none of the 12 Apostles were qualified for anything but to be farmers, fishermen, or tax collectors. Yet, Jesus chose them as well. But Jesus did not choose them without promising to give them what they might need to fulfill their roles. Likewise, it will be my responsibility to make sure that parishioners will

receive the formation, direction, and guidance that they might need.

Like the first disciples and Apostles, it does not matter what qualification you may or may not have. It does not even matter how young or old any of you might be. It only depends on each of your personal commitments to this faith community that you have chosen to be your "spiritual home."

For the time being, I ask for your prayers. I know that I expressed a certain joy in coming to a parish with a sizeable staff. But, as I go deeper into the life of our parish community, I cannot continue forward without making necessary changes. Please keep me in your prayers that I might make choices enlightened by the Holy Spirit. Pray for staff members whose lives will be impacted by those choices. And please pray for the entire parish community, that we might move forward into the future focused on our divine mission to make disciples of all nations.



Weekend Masses

As we continue to move forward through our reopening process, our needs evolve and we are able to fine-tune them.

Here are three main areas that our volunteers focus on. If you think you might be interested in helping out or just would like more information, please let us know by contacting! Deaconed@stjulie.org or sheila@stjulie.org

Greeters – Typically for weekend Mass, we have two greeters at each entrance to welcome you. One will check folks in and the other will sanitize their hands. If you have time after Mass to assist with cleaning, we never turn anyone away!

Ushers – Our ushers seat parishioners in a safe manner using the blue markers on the pews for guides. They also usher them safely to receive Holy Communion and then again at dismissal. If you have time after Mass to assist with cleaning, we never turn anyone away!

Cleaning Team – Our cleaning team takes care of the restroom during Mass and then cleanup of the worship space after Mass. It takes about 20-30 minutes after Mass is over.

Sacramental Services

Weekend Mass is the main area that we look for volunteers. However, if you would like to offer your time at a less populated event, we also need folks for Funerals, Baptisms, Weddings, Adoration and Reconciliation.

St. Julie has been blessed by wonderful people who graciously give of themselves as the need arises. If you are feeling called to ministry, this could be for you! Thank you for your consideration.

OUR SHARING PARISH CEASED ON JULY 1

A number of years ago a program known as Sharing Parish was established in the Archdiocese of Chicago. The idea was to connect parish communities together to share faith experiences and offer support to each other. In many of those pairings, things such as pulpit exchanges, choir visits for Mass, shared ministries and financial support were hallmarks of the relationships fostered. Over the years, many of these connections dwindled to simply parishes offering financial support to the Sharing Parish that was more economically challenged.

In this time of *Renew My Church* there is much discussion about the "remnants" of the program, especially as parishes are merged or closed. Our sharing parish, *Our Lady of Peace*, is one of the parishes that ceased to exist as it was merged on July 1, 2020. For many years, the people of St. Julie Billiart have been generous in their support.

For online givers, the option to contribute to Sharing Parish has been removed. In the recent batch of donation envelopes for July/ August, there is no longer a Sharing Parish envelope.







He spoke to them another parable.

"The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed with three measures of wheat flour until the whole batch was leavened."

All these things Jesus spoke to the crowds in parables.

He spoke to them only in parables, to fulfill what had been said through the prophet:

I will open my mouth in parables, I will announce what has lain hidden from the foundation of the world.

Then, dismissing the crowds, he went into the house. His disciples approached him and said,

"Explain to us the parable of the weeds in the field."

He said in reply, "He who sows good seed is the Son of Man, the field is the world, the good seed the children of the kingdom. The weeds are the children of the evil one, and the enemy who sows them is the devil. The harvest is the end of the age, and the harvesters are angels. Just as weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age. The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all who cause others to sin and all evildoers. They will throw them into the fiery furnace, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Whoever has ears ought to hear."







Father Ismael Garcia Sainz was born in Evanston and raised in Mexico.

"If I have to choose a point in my life to start talking about my vocation, it would be at my first Communion," he said. "I remember the priest telling me, 'Do not let this day be the first and last time you receive Christ,' and as I received Christ for the first time, I felt a fire inside me, like the sensation you get after getting on a roller coaster. I wanted to know more about him, the one I received. My mother got me involved as an altar server, and I noticed that the Mass was not boring anymore. I had to be awake and ready to serve at the altar. I started to enjoy Mass and paid more attention."

He was invited to a retreat at a seminary when he was 15. "I was excited for the invitation, but I did not know what a seminary was. He explained to me, and then my excitement turned into shock. I was shocked and surprised that a place like that existed," he said. "I guess I never thought priests are normal human beings. I was also shocked that an ordinary guy like me could be called to serve the people of God as a priest."

He started seminary in Morelia, Mexico, and then came to Chicago,

starting at Casa Jesús and then attending St. Joseph College Seminary.

"I was captivated by the different people attending Mass," Garcia said. "I was able to see the universality of the church, people from all over the world sharing the same faith. I am fascinated by the different expressions of faith in the different cultures, the richness in their traditions and joy in their faith."

Father Patrick Gorman was born in Park Ridge and then moved with his family to Columbus, Ohio. He studied computer science, earning a bachelor's degree at the University of Notre Dame. It was during graduate school at Purdue University that he "discerned out" of computer science and began a decade-long search for his vocation. "The search took me to Taiwan to become a kindergarten teacher, to Alabama to work at a startup doing research and software development, and ultimately to China to learn Chinese," Gorman said. "I knew that I wanted to find some kind of meaningful work and to serve others, but I didn't know what form it would take."

He worked in a non-governmental organization doing microfinance in China, but still felt something was missing.

"I had a great group of faithful friends and a great local parish, and in this context I was able to begin to discern God's call more clearly," Gorman said. "I felt like He was calling me to the priesthood, and after a lot of prayer and reading, I felt that call confirmed."

CHOOSING TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Sometimes I miss all the commotion that used to fill my house when my children were young. There were always baseball and volleyball practices, cub scout meetings, pack gatherings, science projects, leaf collections, Homecoming parades/games/dances, and, of course, the occasional sleepovers. All these activities filled every free moment of time I had outside of my job. I'm glad most of them are in the past, but, there is one of them that I DO miss: the sleepovers.

My twins would often invite two (and sometimes more!) of their friends over for the night. They would actually arrive early afternoon and we'd begin with dinner out at one of their favorite restaurants. I especially remember one young friend of theirs, Jessica. She became a regular at our house. She was a very nice, polite, fun-loving young lady. But that isn't why I remember her. I remember her because when she spent the night her sister, Katie, came with her. Katie was verrrry quiet and shy. She was a year younger than the other girls but Jessica always included her because her extreme shyness led to her being a loner in her own class. Over the years, she seemed to open up – a little. I'm sure she was quite talkative around my girls, but with me she was always hesitant. Now that they are older their contact with each other is less frequent so most of their

interaction is by Facebook. That's why it was such a thrill for me to run into Katie several months ago while out shopping.

She had grown into a beautiful, self-assured young woman. We stopped for coffee to catch up on the latest family news. We had a wonderful visit but soon it was time to go. As we were saying our goodbyes, she stopped and got very serious for a moment. She said to me, "Mrs. Guadagno, I want to tell you how much I appreciated being included in all those wonderful times at your house. You and Mary and Jenny always made me feel so welcome – like I belonged. It made all the difference in the world to me as I got older." I was silent for a moment, and then, just as seriously said, "You're very welcome, Katie. But always remember that you DID belong!"

As I drove home, I remembered thinking that no matter how much I had enjoyed those sleepovers, I never saw them as being life-changing. They were just one of those milestones you had to cross when you're a parent. For Katie, though, they were a milestone that made a huge difference in her development into a lovely woman.

I thought about all of this after reading today's gospel earlier in the week. Jesus tells the disciples that it is good to leave the weeds with the wheat until all are fully grown. You never know if you might make a mistake if you try to separate them because in the end, it is only God who really knows who is a weed and who is wheat. If my girls had decided that Katie

couldn't be included in their sleepovers, what a loss it would have been – for Katie *and* for my girls. They chose to be patient and kind and nurture Katie rather than leave her by the wayside. Without even knowing it they were making this gospel come alive in all our lives. I'm so glad because it makes me see that sometimes the gospel message isn't about big overwhelming issues of good and evil, sometimes the gospel is just about choosing to be on the side of patience and love.

Check your temperature: if you have one, please do not come to church.



Stay home if you are ill.



Make sure you have a face covering to bring and wear.



Remember to bring your registration if you are not already on a list of attendees.



WHEN YOU ARRIVE



Enter only in marked doorways.



Wait patiently to be checked in by greeter.



Keep your face covering or mask on at all times except for receiving Communion.



Sanitize your hands as directed by greeter.



Observe social distancing at all times (look for marks on the floor).



Ushers will direct you to pews with markings showing where to sit.



Since there will be no passing of baskets for your offering please leave your offering in the boxes provided at the entrance and exit areas.

DURING THE SERVICE



Do not change seats during a service.



There will be no passing of offering baskets.



No physical sign of peace will be exchanged during Mass.



Follow instructions for Communion:

- Leave your seat only when directed by usher or greeter.
- Maintain six feet social distancing in the Communion line – look for marks on the floor.
- When 12 feet or two people away from the priest, sanitize your hands using the sanitizer from the usher. After sanitizing do not touch any surfaces.
- Approach the priest only after you are called forward. DO NOT remove your face covering.
- Extend a single hand to receive the Host.
- After moving six feet to the right or left, remove your mask and consume the Host.
- Replace your face covering or mask.
- Follow instructions to return to your pew.

Please take any worship aids you may have brought with you.



You will be dismissed by pew or seating area. Follow the instructions of the greeter or usher.



Use only the designated exit doors.
