PROCESSIONS - A CATHOLIC TRADITION

Next weekend will be the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ. It is also known by the Latin phrase of Corpus Christi. In many parts of the world, it is still customary that an outdoor procession is held to carry the Blessed Sacrament. At St. Julie's, we will also have a procession outdoors, weather permitting. It will take place immediately after the 11:30am Mass. We will begin in church with the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, continue with the outdoor procession, and conclude with Benediction in church before the Blessed Sacrament is once again reposed in the tabernacle. All are invited to take part in this procession.

In many instances, Corpus Christi processions are highlighted by a rectangular canopy that is carried during the procession. The canopy goes above the monstrance that contains the Blessed Sacrament and it is attached to four poles which are carried by four pole bearers. We do not have one here at the parish but the canopy has been a part of Corpus Christi processions even from ancient times.

In fact, processions have been a part of Catholic tradition for many years. In the Early Church, there was probably not as much "pomp and circumstance" as we might see today. Much of the customs the Church uses today were adapted from the times when Roman armies and emperors were still a part of everyday life. The procession is one of those customs.

In the time of the Early Church, it would be a regular sight to see emperors, kings, and dignitaries being paraded around in the streets. Soldiers would even march together in formation as a display of their power and prominence. In each of these instances, at the head of the procession would be people carrying banners and other symbols of the ruler or the army. Next, there would follow soldiers or other high officials of the king.

The most important person would be at the end of the procession which most often would be the king or highest ranking officer in the army. In other words, the "person in charge" was always toward the end of the procession as a way to emphasize that person's great importance and influence. This person of great importance was always positioned higher than the

ordinary people. For example, kings and queens would be carried on a covered platform elaborately decorated. High ranking officers would ride on a majestic horse also decorated elaborately. The symbolism would not be lost on the average citizen that this person was positioned higher than anyone else because of that person's great importance.

Behind the king or high ranking officer would be more attendants the processions would be a way of asserting supreme dominance and authority. When the ordinary people saw such processions coming into their villages, towns, or cities, it would be a spectacle to see. Everyone was expected to come out and bow whenever the king, queen, dignitary, or high ranking officer would pass.

In the time of the Early Church, the first Christians began to adopt and adapt many civil customs such as the procession. It was not a case of using the "trappings of society" for no apparent reason. Rather, from the perspective of the Christian faith, it was an attempt to assert the authority and dominance of the One True Ruler of both Heaven and Earth—Jesus Christ who is Savior and King of the Universe. In other words, the Church adapted such customs as a way to declare to all—secular and religious alike—that the only one who deserved such honor and reverence was and always Jesus Christ who is the rightful king of all. It was an attempt to counteract the secular habit of giving too much honor to a human being—to the point of giving that human being a divine status—and turning the hearts of the people to the One True God who alone is worthy of all praise and worship.

Today, we can notice the Church's custom follows a similar pattern. If we take a look at the opening processions at Mass, we can see the similarities and know how the Church is emphasizing the truth that Jesus our God is truly the focus of the hearts of all disciples. First in the procession is the cross. Like the banners and symbols carried in the civic and military processions, the cross is the symbol of our one and only ruler. The cross is the symbol of God's victory over sin and death. It is right that the cross is the first thing that is carried.

Next, behind the cross would be the Lord's attendants. They may not be soldiers or dignitaries. But, the fact that they minister to the Lord in a special capacity—lector, minister of Communion, or a deacon—makes their role in the liturgy a special one. For that reason, they are next in line in the Church's processions.

Last in line, of course, would be the priest. In liturgies where a bishop presides, last in line would be the bishops, then the main bishop presider. Behind the bishop would be the Masters of Ceremony and the servers to carry his crosier and mitre. The priest stands in the place of Christ. The bishop has the fullness of Christ's priesthood so he is considered as the "high priest." In either case, the ordained priest is last in procession but the emphasis is not on him per se. Rather, the focus is on Jesus Christ himself who is represented in bodily form by the ordained priest or bishop.

In reality, religious processions have been used by people of all faiths even from before the time of the Early Church. For example, the ancient Jewish people also had processions for various feasts and occasions. The Torah – the scrolls that would contain the first five Books of the Old Testament which were considered to be the most sacred – would oftentimes be carried in procession accompanied by festive music and dance. Other religious traditions have also done the same. So, in essence, it is not a strange thing for the Early Church to have incorporated the same in its prayer and liturgy.


Processions became a natural form of the spirituality and devotion of the faithful. A procession has always been a reminder that the faithful are constantly on pilgrimage. We walk this journey of life on earth with the intent of reaching our final destination of heaven. Whenever the Church holds a procession – during the liturgy or even as part of a devotional practice – it always reminds us that we are sojourners all trying to follow Christ.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Once in a while, people would stop me after Mass and asked questions. These often gave me opportunities to refresh my understanding of our faith and to recognize my limitation, “sorry, I don’t know that question,” and so to encourage me to learn/foster especially the virtue of

humility. Lately, a few people asked me:

Why Jesus told Mary Magdalene, “touch me not”?

When Mary recognized the Lord after the Resurrection calling “Rabboni/Teacher,” it is then that Jesus tells her not to touch him because He has not yet “ascended” to his Father. However, Jesus asked the doubting Thomas to touch His wounds. Well, the best explanation could be unlike Thomas, Mary already believes he is Jesus and Jesus’s saving work is not finished at His Resurrection. In other words, Jesus says, “I am resurrected from the dead but I am not back among you for good. My saving work will not be completed until I send you the Holy Spirit, and I will return again.” Given this fact, Jesus ascended to heaven so the Holy Spirit could descend upon the disciples and us. An extra point for Jesus ascending and sitting at the right hand of the Father is to point to the fact that Jesus is now the high priest and giving humanity the gift of priesthood feeding us with heavenly food—the Eucharist.

God’s presence is everywhere, where do I have to go to Mass on Sunday?

A short answer for this is relating to our relationship with family and friends. How would we respond to a celebratory feast invitation that our loved one caringly put together? “I love you and I will be at home thinking about your love and the feast?” No, right? Knowing that God’s presence is everywhere but mostly at Mass when the Lord throws a festive meal for us—Scriptures and The Eucharist. So, going to Mass on Sunday is not a must but a why not!

June is the Month of Sacred Heart of Jesus, what should I do to foster this beautiful devotion?

Have the heart of the Lord! What does it mean? It means to follow him closely. As he has touched your hearts with compassion and love and so do you. You can spend a few minutes or an hour adoring the Lord

in front of the Blessed Sacrament; bring Christ’s presence to those you interact with daily by talking about this devotion, give water to the thirsty and bread to the hungry not for the sake of feeling good because we have done something beautiful but we do it because Christ has impelled us to love, and so on.

What is the current of the Catholic on Pro-life?

Life is sacred from the moment of conception to natural death. From USCCB, it says “Given the *scientific* fact that a human life begins at conception, the only moral norm needed to understand the Church’s opposition to abortion is the principle that *each and every human life has inherent dignity, and thus must be treated with the respect due to a human person*. This is the foundation for the Church’s social doctrine, including its teachings on war, the use of capital punishment, euthanasia, health care, poverty and immigration. Conversely, to claim that some live human beings do *not* deserve respect or should *not* be treated as “persons” (based on changeable factors such as age, condition, location, or lack of mental or physical abilities) is to deny the very idea of *inherent* human rights. Such a claim undermines respect for the lives of many vulnerable people before and after birth.” If you are struggling with this type of questions, please contact your priests and have a conversation. I strongly believe that with the grace of the Lord, we will encounter the truth since Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life.

The bishop was always serving others. When he learned that we took fifty teens to Juarez for a mission trip, he wanted to hear more and tell them how proud he was. He was born with a servant's heart and has never waived from that. He exudes kindness and compassion. It's a high bar for all of us.

Archbishop Gustavo (San Antonio) did not hesitate to go to the people in Uvalde, Texas who were devastated with grief and loss. He went, stayed until the wee hours and then returned again day after day. **He ran toward those who needed comfort.** It would be easy to provide lip service or a statement to the press and move on, but he didn't. He presided at Mass, he sat and prayed with the

families, the grief-stricken community, the children from the surrounding schools and on and on.

In every heartbreak, there comes a glimmer of hope. A light. For those in Uvalde, Texas, Archbishop Gustavo is leading the way out of the darkness into the light. The Catholic Church can be proud of the ministry he provides. Better still, we can strive to be more like him. The world needs more compassion and kindness. More people willing to get out of our comfort zones and reach out to others. We can't all be in Texas but we can pray for them. Here at home, we can reach out to those struggling or in need of comforting. *In times of trouble, we can choose to be a helper.*




